MR. HOLAHAN: I'm going to call 1 to order the workshop for February 19. Start 2 with the Pledge of Allegiance. 3 (Pledge of Allegiance recited.) 4 MR. MS. PICKARD: So she needs 1 2 to --MR. CARROLL: -- with -- with 3 the resolution, that I think we should --4 MS. PICKARD: We should be 5 6 doing at the --MR. CARROLL: -- house --7 provide some housekeeping on. 8 MR. REISS: First of all --9 right. First of all, if you have a codification, 10 you have to bite the bullet and spend the money 11 quarterly, semiannually, to get it updated, 12 because otherwise there's -- you spend a lot of 13 money to codify it, and if it's not up to date, 14 15 it's useless. So if there was a period of 16 time where the township wasn't sending updates to 17 18 the publisher --MS. PICKARD: There's been 19 20 several years until this one. No. We did --MR. JABLOWSKI: 21 22 MR. CARROLL: Yeah. We did one, I MR. JABLOWSKI: 23 think, at the end of December. I'll have to get 24 25 the exact date.

MR. CARROLL: That's the one 1 2 that just came. MR. JABLOWSKI: Yeah, so that 3 was seven or twelve different -- I mean, it 4 was -- it was a whole -- there's a booklet. 5 MR. CARROLL: I have it. Ι 6 didn't open it to put it in my book yet. 7 MR. REISS: But I guess my 8 concern is, though, that if the public either --9 someone has to communicate with the publisher to 10 say the codification online, which they control, 11 and the codification that they print, which they 12 control, doesn't match. 13 MR. CARROLL: Right. 14 MR. REISS: You know, they need 15 16 to correct it. MR. JABLOWSKI: And part of our 17 discussion with them was to do that, so thank 18 19 you. We're going to call --MR. CARROLL: Ask Barbara. 20 I -- I didn't keep a copy --21 MR. JABLOWSKI: Yeah, we're --22 MR. CARROLL: -- of it. I made 23 my changes and gave it to her just for 24 25 discussion.

PICKARD: We just have to 6 7 make sure that all the sections are going to hit 8 the right area. Currently match. MR. REISS: 9 MR. HOLAHAN: Yes. 10 What general code 11 MS. PICKARD: does have is a new legislation section. So all 12 13 the new ordinances are in that section until we 14 send them to codify it. MR. REISS: I think what the 15 problem is, and I've seen this in other times 16 17 where Barbara has sent me provisions to update or 18 change, she cites sections that when I go online -- because that's what I use, the online 19 20 version. 21 MS. PICKARD: I do too. MR. REISS: -- it's a different 22 section number, and I just assume it's -- I 23 always just assumed it was a typographical error 24 25 or something, but now it sounds like it isn't.

MR. CARROLL: Yeah, I did too. 1 When -- in -- in the -- I -- I don't know if I 2 have it here, but where you cite it in the 3 resolution like the sections, I'm pretty sure 4 when I looked online, it -- it doesn't exist the 5 way -- or online it's one way, in our hard copy 6 it is -- it doesn't exist or --7 MS. PICKARD: Unless it's 8 something in between. 9 MR. CARROLL: I don't know. 10 MS. PICKARD: The sign 11 ordinance might not be codified --12 MR. CARROLL: Yeah. 13 MR. REISS: No. The sign 14 15 ordinance. MS. PICKARD: -- yet because we 16 just did that --17 MR. CARROLL: Yeah, that's 18 19 correct. So it actually MS. PICKARD: 20 might be sign -- you know, going to that. 21 MR. REISS: Correct. 22 MR. CARROLL: But that was one 23 of them. And -- and in our ordinance, I felt the 24 vehicle signs, the definition that we had in the 25

Further discussion from the 1 2 board? Anything from the public? 3 MR. HOLAHAN: Okay. All in 4 5 favor, aye? BOARD MEMBERS: Aye. 6 MR. HOLAHAN: Opposed? 7 Motion carries. 8 The next item came MR. REISS: 9 up as a result of legislation that's working its 10 way through Harrisburg to allow for some 11 additional liquor licenses to come into the 12 township at the -- what is right now the PCRED 13 14 District. MR. HOLAHAN: Um-hmm. 15 MR. REISS: That legislation 16 refers to a Mixed Use Town Center Development 17 District. So we have to change the name of the 18 PCRED to match the state legislation. 19 draft ordinance, which I circulated to everybody, 20 that's all that ordinance does. 21 And all I'm asking tonight is 22 for authorization to send it out to the township 23 and county planning commissions. I'm assuming 2.4 they're not going to have any problems with the 25

changes. And so if you want me to advertise it, 1 I could, or we could wait to get their comments 2 3 back. There is one additional change 4 in there, and actually this was in the Omnibus 5 amendment, and that was a typographical error 6 7 that's for the parking aisles. I think it said 8 angle or something, so we changed it. MR. CARROLL: Oh, right, right, 9 right, yep. 10 I'm -- I'm fine MS. PICKARD: 11 12 with that. 13 MR. HOLAHAN: Yep. I'll make a 14 MS. PICKARD: motion that we send the proposed amendment to the 15 zoning ordinance renaming the PCRED District as 16 MTCD District and typographical changes to the 17 18 P -- township PC and the county PC and authorize 19 advertising. MR. CARROLL: Second. 20 MR. HOLAHAN: I have a motion 21 22 and a second. Further discussion from the 23 24 board? 25 Anything from the public?

Hearing none. Call the vote. 1 All in favor, aye? 2 3 BOARD MEMBERS: Aye. Opposed? MR. HOLAHAN: 4 Motion carries. 5 This next item is 6 MR. REISS: something you addressed last year, but the 7 township staff found that we weren't -- didn't 8 address it completely. You amended Chapter 99 9 for parks to allow alcoholic beverages in the 10 parks; however, further down in Chapter 99 there 11 was another area that had a spec -- another 12 specific prohibition about alcoholic beverages in 13 the park that's still in the ordinance. 14 So I drafted an amendment that 15 would take that provision out as well so it's 16 consistent with your other prohibitions and 17 18 restrictions. MR. HOLAHAN: Okay. 19 Now, if we're MS. PICKARD: 20 going to do the park board, is any of that going 21 to be in the ordinance at all about --22 If you're going to MR. REISS: 23 create a park board, that's actually authorized 24 by state statute, so you would have to do an 25

ordinance to create a park and rec board. 1 Should we wait MS. PICKARD: 2 until -- we're going to be doing that next month. 3 Should we do that all at once? 4 5 MS. CANFIELD: Our understanding was that it wasn't a formal park 6 and recreation board. 7 MS. PICKARD: Okay. 8 MS. CANFIELD: Our consultant 9 was looking more towards --10 MR. CARROLL: An advisory --11 MR. JABLOWSKI: Advisory 12 13 committee. MS. CANFIELD: -- one to two 14 days work session just to talk with the people 15 that are chosen and get the ideas and then put 16 17 them together in a package. MR. HOLAHAN: Okav. 18 MR. JABLOWSKI: That's 19 (inaudible) committee. 20 MS. PICKARD: We don't need to 21 have an ordinance for that? 22 MR. REISS: Not for that. 23 seems like an ad hoc committee just to work with 24 25 a consultant on an advisory --

MS. PICKARD: I thought we were 1 going to continue with it. That was my 2 3 understanding, but --MS. CANFIELD: That's up to the 4 5 board. MR. HOLAHAN: Okay. Do I have 6 7 a motion to --MR. CARROLL: Can -- can I ask 8 9 something, John? MR. HOLAHAN: Sure. 10 MR. CARROLL: Something came up 11 after we did that ordinance last summer that was 12 brought to my attention that I $\operatorname{--}$ and $\operatorname{--}$ and when 13 we were doing that, I think it was our intention 14 to allow it here at Blanche Price for the people 15 that rent the facilities. And then it was my 16 understanding there were some issues --17 MR. HOLAHAN: Ball parks and 18 19 stuff? MR. CARROLL: -- at the ball 20 parks that maybe -- do we -- if we have the 21 opportunity, do we want to -- can you do it both 22 23 ways or only --MR. REISS: Well, you can --24 MR. CARROLL: -- permitted only 25

at Blanche Price when -- when a facility is 1 rented through the township through the --2 3 MR. REISS: You could -- you 4 could --MR. CARROLL: I don't know how 5 that works. But I don't know. So I heard some 6 complaints from parents of people drinking at 7 8 the --MR. HOLAHAN: Oh, I gotcha. 9 MR. CARROLL: -- little league 10 games at Keiper Field and Locust Ridge Field and 11 12 things that --13 MR. REISS: You can do --MR. CARROLL: -- made people 14 15 uncomfortable. MR. REISS: -- it however you 16 want in those regards. So if you want to carve 17 out restrictions or carve out exemptions, you can 18 19 do that. I think we -- I 20 MR. HOLAHAN: 21 think we need to talk about doing that too. Yeah. MR. CARROLL: And, you 22 know, maybe -- I think that could be a discussion 23 24 that --MS. PICKARD: Can we table this 25

So we have a 20 different invoice number for each, but that's 21 what I had been doing before was just break it 22 23 down by project.

all went under 414 for zoning/legal, so we don't 1 know what was billed out and how much was 2 in-house, but it's helpful to know that \$3,000 of 3 that \$10,000 bill was Kalahari's. 4 MS. CANFIELD: It is all --5 MS. PICKARD: And a thousand 6 7 was --MS. CANFIELD: -- in the bill 8 pack itself. It has the breakout, but we can do 9 10 it --I know, but we 11 MS. PICKARD: want it on the breakdown that goes to the board. 12 And the other thing was, again, and I had 13 mentioned to you with the projects, there's 14 another \$30,000 bill in there for HRG. We still 15 don't have the permit for the parking lot, so 16 we're a little concerned about that. And I had 17 18 asked if you could initial them, but we want a report with those project bills because, 19 honestly, it's like a crap shoot. We're billed, 20 we don't know what we're paying for. We looked 21 at them, but we have no way of knowing what was 22 23 done and what to recommend. 24 MS. CANFIELD: Okay.

MS. PICKARD:

But we're

still -- I was very surprised that it was \$90,000 1 for HRG and that we just paid them 25 last month 2 and we have 30,000 this month and what was 3 actually done and accomplished, so we could see 4 that. JABLOWSKI: Yeah. We asked 23 him to be. He called this morning just to let 24 Margie know that he couldn't be here. 25 texted him and I said --

MR. CARROLL: He's not coming? 1 2 Is that what you said? 3 T ' m MR. JABLOWSKI: Correct. sorry. So I asked him, I said, we'd like to 4 provide the board some update. He mentioned that 5 6 an RACP Grant has gone in for 3.8 million. 7 That's under the purview --MS. PICKARD: 3.8 million? 8 9 MR. JABLOWSKI: Correct. It's 10 currently under review. There's a public comment 11 period, which is now. They expect award 12 announcement sometime in April. 13 MS. PICKARD: And when does a 14 build grant go in? 15 MR. JABLOWSKI: As soon as the 16 window opens up. 17 MS. PICKARD: Okay. So we 18 haven't heard anything on that? 19 MR. JABLOWSKI: No. Ιt 20 hasn't -- in addition, we're looking at applying 21 for multimodal for the other section of 940 on 22 the eastside. We have the order of magnitude 23 from Pennoni on the construction for the roadway. MS. PICKARD: Is that for the 24 25 limited access?

Correct. Curb MR. JABLOWSKI: 1 the limited access and curb the intersections. 2 3 MS. PICKARD: Did we get approval for that? 4 5 MR. JABLOWSKI: No. But we're -- we need to begin the process of applying 6 for a multimodal grant. We haven't got PennDOT's 7 approval yet, but we look at multimodal funding 8 9 for that. So let's Okay. 10 MR. HOLAHAN: talk about the firefighter service stipend 11 program or the FSSP. Got a nice ring to it. 12 13 MR. JABLOWSKI: Thank you. MR. PICKARD: Could you 14 15 pronounce that? FSSP. In an 16 MR. HOLAHAN: effort to provide a reimbursement for the service 17 18 provided by firefighters in Tobyhanna Township and encourage participation and as a vital 19 protective effort in our community, the FSSP has 20 been developed. And so here's proposed 21 22 highlights of the program. There'd be a service stipend of 23 \$350 a year that members can choose to accept or 24 waive. Qualified for this service stipend would 25

be a life member or an active member meeting the 1 2 listed-below criteria. So they have to --3 MS. PICKARD: Uniform cleaning 4 5 allowance, is that the UCA? MR. HOLAHAN: Yeah. So they 6 7 have to -- and -- and that's one of the ways it was discussed on how you could -- what's the 8 monitor that we would -- we would give this so 9 that -- they're concerned about it doesn't look 10 11 like payroll. 12 MS. PICKARD: Okay. Right. So what 13 MR. HOLAHAN: they need to do to qualify is respond to 25 14 15 percent of calls, attend 25 percent of the drills, and attend 6 business meetings. And it's 16 calculated on a period of 12 months. 17 18 MR. CARROLL: I think there was -- it's on the back. 19 20 MR. HOLAHAN: Hmm? MR. CARROLL: I thought there 21 was two pages, but it's on the back. 22 23 MR. HOLAHAN: Right. We're 24 saving resources and trash. MS. PICKARD: So if the life 25

1 member is not an active anymore, they can still 2 get an annual stipend? 3 MR. HOLAHAN: Yes, yep. Life 4 members are --5 MR. ED TUTRONE: You want me to 6 talk a little about it? 7 Yeah, yeah. MR. HOLAHAN: Go 8 ahead, Ed. 9 MR. ED TUTRONE: Ed Tutrone, 10 Tobyhanna Fire Company President. 11 So we -- we worked along with 12 the fire commission to come up with this. And, 13 yes, I would -- basically in our bylaws it states our life members are entitled to everything our 14 active members are entitled to. So the \$350 15 16 stipend was the EIT for the earned income and 17 also for the property relief. There was some 18 concern that if people are members and they're renters, instead of owning a house, that they 19 20 wouldn't get the benefit even though they're 21 putting in the time. 22 MR. CARROLL: Can -Excuse me. 23 can I interrupt you for the public? Because --24 MR. ED TUTRONE: 25 MR. CARROLL: -- this is

confusing to me. 1 JJ, the -- the Pennsylvania --2 the state enacted a law to give property tax 3 relief to -- to emergency services providers, 4 fire company, EMS -- right? -- I think, is --5 and -- and I think we felt --6 MR. ED TUTRONE: Yeah, I'll 7 8 back up a pace, yeah. MR. CARROLL: So -- so I -- I 9 10 just think people are going to -- what are we 11 talking about? MR. ED TUTRONE: Yeah, I'll 12 back -- I -- I'm sorry. Yeah. 13 MR. CARROLL: So -- so the 14 state is -- has offered some -- some financial 15 compensation to emergency services providers 16 17 in -- in tax relief. Right? MR. ED TUTRONE: Through the 18 19 township. MR. CARROLL: I'll let you 20 21 speak, but I think --Well, the state 22 MR. JABLOWSKI: basically punted the ball back to local 23 governments, and the state allowed local 24 governments to give some of the revenue back. 25

MR. CARROLL: Okay.

MR. JABLOWSKI: So the state,

in my opinion, didn't do crap.

MR. CARROLL: Okay.

MR. JABLOWSKI: They said, you can do it. So the state program will allow for an earned income tax credit provision and -- and a -- and the homeowner's provision, but, really, when you drill down to that, most volunteer firefighters that are active, may not own a home because they're in their 20s or 30s, so -- and their -- their income isn't as high as if you're in your 40s or 50s usually. So the -- the discussion here to create what we created here, our proposal, basically provides that incentive regardless if you own a home or not.

And that's not the criteria, not your income or your property, but basically your service and, really, base any stipend on your service whether you have a lifetime of service or you're currently active or both.

MR. CARROLL: So this program is really a -- a -- a hybrid -- it's your own creation of what maybe works well for Tobyhanna Township and not what the rest of the world is

1 doing. MR. REISS: Well, actually --2 MR. CARROLL: Right? Or --3 MR. REISS: -- a lot of 4 municipalities are doing this because otherwise 5 it creates bookkeeping nightmares for the tax 6 7 collectors --MR. CARROLL: Oh, okay. 8 9 MR. REISS: -- who aren't used to giving -- having credits and things. So I can 10 tell you in Bucks County this is uniformly being 11 done, I think in Montgomery County also, but in 12 13 more counties as well. MR. CARROLL: All right. And 14 15 that's what you provided us, something similar? MR. REISS: I -- I gave you a 16 17 sample --MR. CARROLL: New Britain 18 19 Township or something, I think it was. MR. REISS: -- resolution that 20 21 one township did. And then --22 MR. ED TUTRONE: and then take it one step further. So you have 23 the life members, even if they don't make the 25 24 25 percent of the calls for the year and 25 percent

of the drills to -- to be an active firefighter and get benefits from the fire department. So to bring it a step further to enhance trying to get more people out from the active side who are coming out to the calls and fighting the fires or coming out to the emergencies, we -- we came up with this. And this, I believe, I want to say, Coolbaugh Township is using this also, to where they -- we put in a uniform cleaning allowance because the -- the firefighters that are -and -- and -- and that are going to be coming out for the calls, that's the ones that are going to have the uniforms that -- so then it goes into a -- a uniform cleaning allowance where the fire company will provide the township with a list of all of the people that met that criteria in a year's period.

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Now, it's not gonna be a calendar year in order for the township budget to be able to get it out in December -- the checks out in December to the fire department for their budget, but what's going to happen is the member has to come to the -- give a paper to the chief requesting their money, their stipend. The chief will then look through everything, make sure they

met the criteria, and then the chief will sign off. And then -- I want to say it was by December 1st. Then it would come to the township, then you guys as supervisors would have it for your township meeting in December to be able to cut the check to the fire department.

When that check get cuts to the fire department, then the fire department will disburse it to the members that were eligible and then they will again sign off on a piece of paper stating that they received the check with the check number. And then when it's all said and done, the township will receive a copy of everybody who received a check. So it's checks and balances on the township end and the fire company end. It's not strictly donation from the township to the fire company and then you don't know where it goes after that.

So a little more of an incentive then should be able to try to get more people out to calls. If they hear that they're getting a little bit of money around Christmastime, it might spark their interest a little more to come out.

We did check with workmen's

1 | compensation and also the PA --

1099. So right now --

MR. JABLOWSKI: Compensation

3 | Rating Bureau.

it is -- it is all legal. There's nothing

1 Lakes. So we changed it then to say our primary 2 coverage area. 3 MR. REISS: But this is re --4 this is intended to reimburse only people who 5 live in Tobyhanna Township. Right? 6 MR. HOLAHAN: No. 7 MR. MIKE ERLSTEN: No. You're 8 a member of the Tobyhanna Township Fire Company, 9 T --10 MR. REISS: No. It's supposed 11 to be just the township. 12 MS. PICKARD: And this is 13 attached because this will be a credit --14 MR. REISS: So in Coolbaugh --15 you have people from Coolbaugh in Tobyhanna 16 Township Fire Department, they should be 17 reimbursed by Coolbaugh -- or not reimbursed, but 18 the stipend should come from Coolbaugh. Because, 19 you have to understand, this is all coming about 20 because of the earned income tax credit. 21 MR. JABLOWSKI: No. It's --22 MR. REISS: Yes --23 MS. PICKARD: Or property 24 taxes. 25 MR. REISS: But this is -- this

started because of the state law that says you 1 can get an earned income tax credit and a 2 property tax credit. And the reality is, if you 3 don't live in the township, why should Tobyhanna 4 Township be paying that as -- because if you just 5 went with what the state law authorized --6 Then it would MR. HOLAHAN: 7 only be residents. 8 MR. REISS: Right. 9 And I get that MS. PICKARD: 10 too, but if they're serving in Tobyhanna 11 Township, putting out fires --12 No. I didn't MR. ED TUTRONE: 13 see -- actually, that's what Jonathan's saying. 14 Well, the -- the 350 then would -- would have to 15 come from Coolbaugh. The other one is not part 16 of the -- we want to look at that as part of the 17 18 MR. JABLOWSKI: (Inaudible) tax 19 20 relief. MR. REISS: All rigt. So, for 21 example, I saw a report in Plumstead Township, 22 which has this, and they are paying money to fire 23 departments outside of Plumstead Township that 2.4 has Plumstead Township members as residents. 25

23	MR. MIKE ERLSTEN: So they give				
24	us money?				
25	MR. ED TUTRONE: Yes.				

MR. MIKE ERLSTEN: So I quess 1 2 it's --3 MR. ED TUTRONE: They gave us 4 some tax money and -- and a donation. I want to say it's 20,000 in tax money and then 23,000 in 5 I can't --6 the donation or vice-versa. 7 MR. MIKE ERLSTEN: Whatever. 8 So we can take money from that, that they get 9 from that, to --MR. ED TUTRONE: Well, it's 10 something that -- that I'll bring to Coolbaugh's 11 attention. I'm trying to think on the top -- off 12 13 the top of my head if any of the members that we have right now currently reside in Coolbaugh 14 15 Township. 16 Ed, you had MS. CANFIELD: mentioned that Coolbaugh is doing similar. 17 you know, do they have similar bylaws to 18 Tobyhanna where if someone is living in Tobyhanna 19 but part of their coverage area, they can go join 20 21 their fire department? MR. ED TUTRONE: That I don't 22 23 know. MR. CARROLL: Well, they'd had 24 to follow the law too, maybe -- didn't we --25

weren't we going to invite, John, the --1 MR. HOLAHAN: Yes. 2 MR. CARROLL: -- their chief to 3 the fire commission meeting? 4 MR. HOLAHAN: Yes. 5 Maybe that's MR. CARROLL: 6 something you ca -- maybe you could mold 7 8 something --MR. REISS: And that draft 9 10 resolution --MR. CARROLL: -- retroactively 11 between both. Reciprocal is what I meant. 12 13 Sorry. MR. REISS: The resolution that 14 I have provided with you as an example actually 15 says, must being a resident of the township. 16 MR. ED TUTRONE: And, Jonathan, 17 I'll ask you this question. Not to cross lines, 18 but I know Patrick Armstrong from your firm 19 represents them. Would that be something that if 20 he -- he would draft the same kind of thing that 21 22 you have there? MR. REISS: Assuming this board 23 of supervisors wants to do it. 24 MS. CANFIELD: Jeanine just let 25

us know that they actually approved the EIT --1 MS. JEANINE HOFBAUER: And 2 3 property tax. -- and the MS. CANFIELD: 4 5 property tax credit. MS. JEANINE HOFBAUER: 6 Coolbaugh Township for -- Coolbaugh Township fire 7 company approved the EIT and property tax. I can 8 look up the rate -- or the sums, but I think it 9 was last month or the month before. 10 MR. REISS: So what that means 11 is, is that a resident from Coolbaugh, who may be 12 a member of the Tobyhanna Township, is going to 13 be getting that credit. You're going to have --14 you as a fire department will have to provide 15 them with the information to say that they 16 qualified, but they should get that credit. 17 MR. JABLOWSKI: But, see, this 18 doesn't -- superceded by state law. I mean, this 19 doesn't have anything to -- this isn't based on 20 21 that. Right. But why --22 MR. REISS: I mean, you -- you need to make a policy 23 2.4 decision. And I think if you look at the state law, the state law was saying that you're doing 25

this for your residents who are active 1 volunteers. I don't know. I mean, I think it's 2 a very slippery slope for you to start saying, 3 okay, we're going to do it for all volunteers no 4 5 matter where they come from. MS. PICKARD: But they're 6 7 active in our fire department. MR. CARROLL: Can you send us a 8 copy of the law for JJ or whatever to look at for 9 10 the --MR. JABLOWSKI: Yeah, but --11 MR. CARROLL: -- to the 12 commission just so you --13 MR. JABLOWSKI: This isn't 14 based on the state law. 15 MR. REISS: Right. 16 17 understand. I mean, I think 18 MR. JABLOWSKI: you're correct in that the policy of the board is 19 the policy of the board. If the board chooses to 20 re -- or to provide a stipend to any individual 21 regardless of his or her residence but that is a 22 member of the Tobyhanna Township Fire Company, I 23 24 think, legislatively, it could do that. 25 MR. REISS: Well, you could,

but here's an example: So in Tobyhanna Township let's say you have some residents from Coolbaugh and Tobyhanna. The residents from Coolbaugh are actually doing better because they're getting an earned income tax credit, they're getting a property tax credit, and they're getting a stipend --

MR. JABLOWSKI: That's correct.

MR. REISS: -- whereas the

people in Tobyhanna are just getting a stipend.

MR. JABLOWSKI: That is true.

MR. HOLAHAN: Mike?

MR. MIKE ERLSTEN: I got a

question. I grew up in Coolbaugh Township, I grew up in Pocono Summit. I belong -- I belonged to, at one time, Pocono Summit Volunteer Fire Company, which is now -- well, whatever the status of it is, whatever it is. But that resides in Tobyhanna Township. So whatever changes with that fire company that that becomes all Tobyhanna Township at some time or whatever they do with it, what happens to the person? 'Cause 99.9 percent of the members that belong to Pocono Summit live in Coolbaugh Township, but the actual facility resides in Tobyhanna Township.

So how does that all work with that? 1 Well, assuming they MR. REISS: 2 qualified for whatever the qualifications that 3 Coolbaugh said you need to be -- to satisfy to 4 get that earned income tax credit and property 5 tax credit, they should get -- get that from 6 Tobyhanna -- Coolbaugh Township. 7 But if they MR. MIKE ERLSTEN: 8 fight -- but they fight the majority of their 9 fires between -- that's why that fire company was 10 there, to fight it between Tobyhanna Township and 11 Coolbaugh Township. So how do yous differentiate 12 between the two townships then? 13 Yeah. Well, MR. HOLAHAN: 14 let's take a look at what that language is 15 because if it says --16 I mean, MR. MIKE ERLSTEN: 17 that's --18 MR. HOLAHAN: If it says 19 firefighter or firefighter resident, or --20 because you could be -- just as you're a 21 volunteer firefighter and a resident of Coolbaugh 22 Township, are you eligible regardless of where 23 24 you serve? I mean, I'm MR. MIKE ERLSTEN: 25

just -- I'm just bringing it up hypothetically because that's -- that happens because half -- I mean, when they did provide service, half was in Emerald Lakes, Stillwater Lakes, and then wherever Tobyhanna Township didn't cover, you know, then they covered stuff in Coolbaugh Township. I mean, they're like in between, so --MR. HOLAHAN: Right. MR. MIKE ERLSTEN: That's the only thing I'm saying is because -- I mean, at one time they had -- they had quite the

only thing I'm saying is because -- I mean, at one time they had -- they had quite the membership, not as big as Tobyhanna Township, but they had -- they had quite a few active members there at one time. I mean, I don't know how it's all gonna go down, but I'm just saying that's gonna come down the road again eventually, I think.

MS. PICKARD: But as long as they can get paid by Coolbaugh and Tobyhanna Township Fire Company, like John's saying, they'll get paid.

MR. REISS: Well, they'll get the credit.

MS. PICKARD: But I do see the issue if they're getting from two places and the

others can't, that doesn't --

MR. HOLAHAN: Well, it depends on what the language is there, because one of the reasons that we looked at going to the alternative was for the people that were not paying property tax that would not get a credit. So you could be a resident of Coolbaugh Township and that -- they're a renter and not realize the credit.

MR. ED TUTRONE: The chief is up there tonight for their meeting. So what I'll do is, I'll send him a text message and I'll ask him to get that language that they put in place and bring it back --

MR. HOLAHAN: Okay.

MR. ED TUTRONE: -- so we could see exactly what they have and then run it by Jonathan, I guess, and see what --

MS. PICKARD: She has it.

MS. JEANINE HOFBAUER: I pulled up the article that I wrote. It indicates that 10 Coolbaugh Township Fire Company volunteers will soon -- excuse me one second -- will soon see some tax relief with the qualifying tax credit cleared through the supervisors. The

incentive allows reimbursement of up to \$250 1 earned income and up to 20 percent in local 2 municipal real estate taxes distributed following 3 supervisor approval. Tax collector's 4 certification, then township check the issuance. 5 So it was the 10 qualifying 6 volunteers with Coolbaugh Township Fire Company 7 that reside in Coolbaugh Township. 8 That's the MR. ED TUTRONE: 9 10 state -- that's the way --11 MR. HOLAHAN: Right. MR. ED TUTRONE: -- the state 12 did it. So they just followed the state 13 14 language. MR. REISS: The state did it, 15 though, for -- you can give it -- see, Tobyhanna 16 17 Township can't give, under the state law, an income tax credit -- earned income tax credit to 18 someone who doesn't live in the township. 19 MR. HOLAHAN: Right. 20 MR. REISS: So if you wanted to 21 follow that earned -- the state law, it would 22 clearly only be applicable to township residents. 23 But it doesn't -- state law doesn't limit it to 24 25 volunteer firemen who fight in that township.

That limitation does not exist. So you could 1 live in Coolbaugh, be a member of Tobyhanna, and 2 still, under state law, qualify for the earned 3 income tax credit and the property tax reduction. 4 Which doesn't MR. HOLAHAN: 5 really help the incentive because it -- Coolbaugh 6 Township's trying to get people for their fire 7 8 company. MR. REISS: Only. 9 MR. HOLAHAN: Right. 10 MR. REISS: Well, they can only 11 12 give that credit --MR. HOLAHAN: To people that 13 14 are residents --MR. REISS: -- of Coolbaugh. 15 MR. HOLAHAN: -- that belong to 16 17 their fire company? That live in MR. REISS: No. 18 19 Coolbaugh. But they could 20 MR. HOLAHAN: be -- they could live in Coolbaugh but be a 21 22 member of Toby. Which --MR. MIKE ERLSTEN: 23 which is -- it happens. 24 25 MR. HOLAHAN: Yeah.

MR. CARROLL: But -- but this 1 was -- this is designed to be more attractive. 2 MR. HOLAHAN: Right. 3 MR. CARROLL: And so does it 4 apply to the state law? Because it's -- it's not 5 an earned inc -- it's not a -- we're not -- we're 6 not writing the fire company a check of Tobyhanna 7 Township taxpayer money. I mean, for that 8 9 reason. MS. PICKARD: Yes, we are. 10 MR. CARROLL: Not -- not -- not 11 as an earned income tax. 12 MR. REISS: You're not paying 13 on the -- you're right. You're -- you're paying 14 a stipend to the volunteer fire department. 15 MR. CARROLL: So is it 16 That is what my question --17 different? So if that's MR. ED TUTRONE: 18 the case then, I think, Jonathan, you're gonna 19 find when you talk to tax attorney, if that's the 20 case, we're not going by any guidelines 21 whatsoever under the tax rebate, then we are 22 going to have to issue 1099s. 23 24 MR. REISS: I think you are. Then this 25 MR. HOLAHAN: Yep.

sounds like this needs to go back to the 1 commission. And we'll see if we can get Bill 2 from Coolbaugh Township to come to our 3 commission -- the fire commission meeting. 4 Tunkhannock's MS. PICKARD: 5 doing this as well? 6 MR. ED TUTRONE: Yeah, I think 7 they did --8 MS. PICKARD: -- because it 9 brings up Emerald Lakes --10 They did the MR. Do you know the language? 13 14 could I get a copy of it? I don't know MR. ED TUTRONE: 15 the language, but from a phone call to the fire 16 commissioner's office that's what we were told. 17 And we as Tobyhanna Township Fire Company would 18 not take somebody with that on their record. 19 MR. HOLAHAN: Okay. Is this 20 21 going to take five minutes, Eddie? MR. ED TUTRONE: Yeah. 22 MR. HOLAHAN: Okay. Let's go 23 24 in executive.
